Information Guide: Prince Edward Island

General Information

Provincial/territorial emergency management organizations coordinate response activities, conduct planning and research, train, administer, and deliver disaster financial assistance programs in their respective province or territory. Funding agreements between emergency management organizations and AANDC help to ensure successful coordinated response and recovery efforts, better clarify roles and responsibilities, and support enhanced preparedness activities, including training and development of more robust community emergency plans for onreserve First Nations.

For all aboriginal communities not considered as on-reserve First Nations communities, Provincial/Territorial emergency management organizations provide the same level of support as they do any community within their respective jurisdictions. These include Metis, First Nations in settlement areas and Inuit communities

AANDC is currently negotiating provincial/territorial bilateral agreements regarding emergency management service provision for on-reserve First Nations

Territorial Policing

The First Nations Policing Program (FNPP), is administered by Public Safety Canada

"A First Nations self-administered policing agreement is an arrangement between Canada, the participating province or territory, and the First Nations community. In these arrangements, the First Nation develops, manages and administers its own police service under provincial legislation. Independent police commissions provide for the impartial and independent oversight of police operations, and the police chief is responsible for the management and administration of the service." As of Feb 22, 2013, over 80% - or 528 of 617 – of the eligible First Nations communities are under the policing program.

Please check with your Band leaders to see if your community is currently participating in the program.

Please note that you might still have to find out exactly where the territorial policing boundaries are, but the website gives you contact information.

Prince Edward Island: The Disaster Services Act

The legislation which covers disasters in Prince Edward Island is called the Emergency Measures Act

There are a few definitions and legal requirements under the Act which are important to understand (note that this list is selected from a larger list and the text has, in some cases, been edited for length).

"Director" means the Director of the Emergency Measures Organization

"disaster" means any real or anticipated occurrence such as disease, pestilence, fire, flood, tempest, explosions, enemy attack or sabotage, which endangers property, the environment or the health, safety or welfare of the civil population

"emergency" means a present or imminent event in respect of which the Minister or municipality believes prompt co-ordination of action or special regulation of persons or property must be undertaken to protect the health, safety or welfare of people or to limit damage to property

"Emergency Measures Organization" means the Prince Edward Island Emergency Measures Organization

"emergency measures plan" means any plan, program or procedure prepared by the province or a municipality that is intended to mitigate the effects of an emergency or disaster and to provide for the safety, health or welfare of the civil population and the protection of property and the environment in the event of such an occurrence

"Fire Marshal" means the fire marshal appointed pursuant to the Fire Prevention Act R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. F-11

"local authority" means the council of a municipality, the Park Superintendent of a National Park or his delegate where an agreement is entered into with the Government of Canada in which it is agreed that the Park Superintendent is a local authority for the purposes of this Act

the Band Council of an Indian Band where an agreement is entered into with the Government of Canada in which it is agreed that the Band Council is a local authority for the purposes of this Act,

in the case of special areas or districts, the Minister responsible for emergency measures

"Minister" means the member of the Executive Council charged by the Lieutenant Governor in Council with the administration of this Act

"municipality" means an area as defined by the Municipalities Act R.S.P.E.I. 1988, Cap. M-13 and includes the Cities of Charlottetown and Summerside, and the Towns of Cornwall and Stratford

"state of emergency" means a state of emergency declared by the Minister pursuant to subsection 9(1)

"state of local emergency" means a state of local emergency declared by a local authority pursuant to subsection 9(2) or by the mayor or chair of a municipality pursuant to subsection 9(2.1)

Thus, "local authorities" is broadly defined to include governance in both incorporated and non-incorporated communities, primarily "councils." Local authorities must submit plans to the Minister for review and integration into general provincial plans. The Minister's duties are to:

7(b) request municipalities to prepare emergency measures plans including mutual assistance programs, and to submit them to the Emergency Measures Organization for review for adequacy and integration with the provincial emergency plan

establish procedures for the prompt and effective implementation of emergency measures plans

request any person to develop emergency measures plans in conjunction with the Emergency Measure Organization or the municipalities to remedy or alleviate any hazard to persons, property or the environment that is or might be created.
